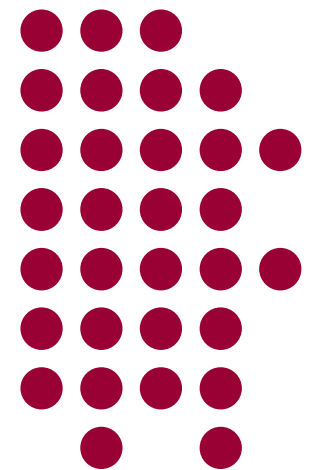


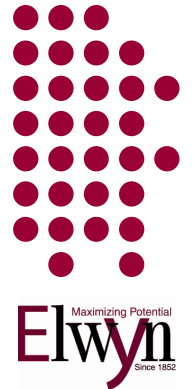

A Tradition of Excellence



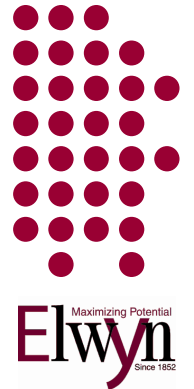
- Since 1852, Elwyn has been providing care and support to those in need.

- served as close advisor to Elwyn's board of trustees when it opened its first residential school for children with special needs

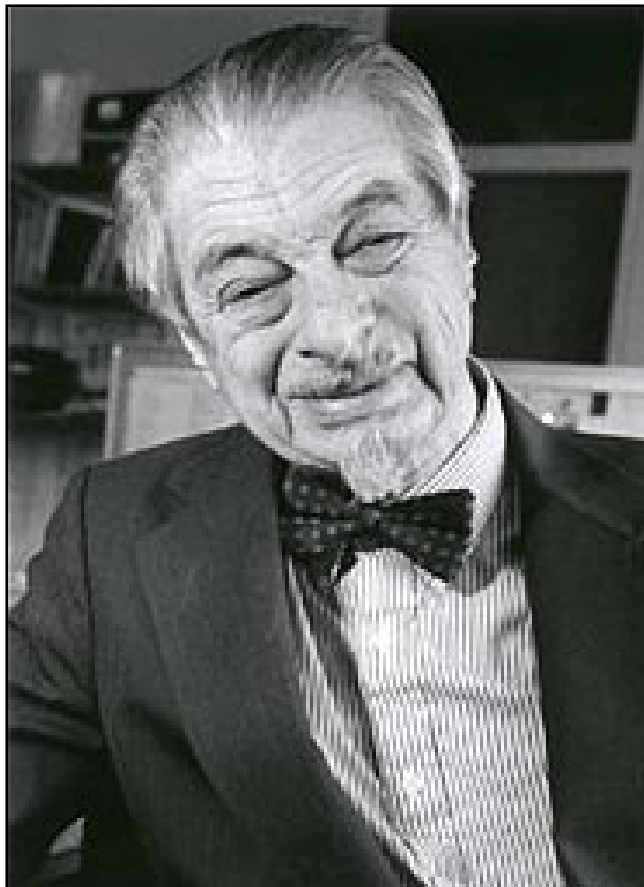
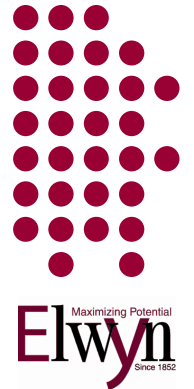


Dorothea Lynde Dix Humanitarian Award

Edward Zigler



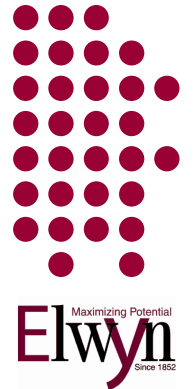
- esteemed professor of psychology at Yale
